



Mountain-Town Character

Grand Junction is a laid-back, friendly city, serving up an authentic downtown mountain vibe where locals kick back with visitors, recounting their adventures and sharing epic firsts while sipping a fresh pint over a spectacular sunset. Vibrant streets boast over 115 award-winning sculptures and murals, perfect for strolling around while exploring boutique shops and enjoying local bites.

Adrenaline Fix

From desert slickrock to ribbons of smooth pavement, the Grand Junction area is a cyclist's dream. Iconic dirt trails include Chutes and Ladders and Zippity Do Da, while the famous paved Rim Rock Drive on the Colorado National Monument offers up endless miles of pristine road cycling. The Grand Mesa is filled with rewarding terrain for both mountain and road cyclists. If water is more your element, paddling and rafting abound on the Colorado and Gunnison Rivers. Or drop a canoe, SUP or kayak into one of the Grand Mesa's 300 lakes. OHV you ask? YES!

Hike, Golf & Bike Year-Round

The temperate climate of the Grand Junction area supports a comfortable year-round climate with an average of 245 days of annual sunshine — making it possible to partake in many of Colorado's famous outdoor pursuits throughout the year. In winter, venture up to a higher altitude to schuss down the slopes at Powderhorn Mountain Resort and take in snow-dusted scenes via cross-country skis or snowshoes, or snowmobile on the Grand Mesa. Or stay at a lower elevation to tee off or hit the trails with your regular ol' hiking boots and experience the beauty of the expansive public lands that surround the city. Immerse Yourself in the Arts

Grand Junction's arts scene is thriving, thanks to a growing community of fervent artisans plus the addition of the Downtown Grand Junction Creative District (one of Colorado's 30). Shop the boutiques and trendy galleries in the Creative District or catch a film, theatrical performance or concert at the Historic Avalon Theatre. Sportsman's Paradise

The tree-studded skylines that form much of Grand Junction's horizon hold more than Colorado's scenic beauty. Thousands of deer, elk, moose, desert bighorn and other game live in those mountains, positioning Grand Junction as the region's base for hunters pursuing their quarry each year. Add to that the hundreds of fishing lakes on the Grand Mesa along with the Colorado and Gunnison Rivers — you'll find there's no shortage of angling opportunities.

Explore Colorado's Wine Country & **Booming Craft-Beverage Scene**

The Grand Junction area is home to the famous Palisade Peach and is the heart of Colorado Wine Country. The Grand Valley American Viticultural Area (AVA) includes 31 wineries and tasting rooms, and is one of only two designated AVAs in Colorado. But there's more to the craft-beverage scene than award-winning wine. The area also has a bounty of breweries and distilleries, such as the long-loved Rockslide Brewery and family-owned Highlands Craft Distillery, where vodka and gin are created inhouse from grain grown as close to Grand Junction as possible. 

Escalante Canyon Petroglyphs, Dominguez-**Escalante National Conservation Area**

In less than 1 mile, you'll walk back in time — 600 million years, that is. This rugged canyon contains important geological, cultural and historical relics such as Native American petroglyphs, some depicting the bighorn sheep that frequent the area.

Lost Lake Trail on the Grand Mesa

There are over 300 lakes on the Grand Mesa, but few match the dream-like beauty of Lost Lake — a

ribbon of clear, glacial water surrounded by basalt boulders, accessed via a pleasant, 2-mile out-andback hike.

Rattlesnake Arches Trail at McInnis **Canyons National Conservation Area**

You don't need to leave Colorado to see natural redrock arches, as Rattlesnake Arches Trail provides the second-largest concentration of arches in the world. This 15-mile round-trip hike will get your heart pumping. It's mostly unshaded, so come prepared with plenty of water and sun protection.

Follow the Locals \mapsto

"From a paleo perspective, the neatest thing to do is to hike the Trail Through Time, which is located right off of Interstate 70 at Mile Marker 2. This 1-mile loop trail allows visitors to see actual dinosaur bones still in place. In the summer, you can also catch volunteers from the Museum of Western Colorado excavating fossil finds at the nearby Mygatt-Moore Quarry.

IF YOU'RE SEEKING ... DOWNHILL THRILLS

Tabeguache Trail

You could bike all the way from Grand Junction to Montrose on the 142-mile Tabequache Trail, but some of the best technical mountain biking in Colorado can be found right by the trailhead — namely, the famed Lunch Loops trail system.

Kokopelli Trail at McInnis **Canyons National** Conservation Area

The many scenic and challenging loops at Kokopelli Trail draw riders from around the state, especially Mack Ridge a ride along a rocky ridgeline high above the Colorado River.

Powderhorn Mountain Resort Bike Park


As ski season closes, the spring snowmelt reveals multiple professionally crafted downhill trails that dip, wind and flow with Powderhorn Mountain's natural terrain. A lift drops you at the top, then it's up to you to navigate the tree roots, rocky obstacles and 1,650 feet of exhilarating elevation drop.

Three Sisters Park

Adjacent to the Tabequache/ Lunch Loops trails and minutes from Downtown Grand Junction, this latest addition to the mountainbiking scene offers multi-use trails with terrain gentle enough for beginners and families.

Palisade Plunge

Downhill fans, rejoice! The U.S. Forest Service recently opened this epic, 32-mile single-track trail that descends 6,000 feet from the top of the Grand Mesa all the way to the high-desert floor. Read more about this thrilling new trail on page 30.



IF YOU'RE SEEKING ... RIDES FOR YOUR **EQUINE COMPANION**

Little Book Cliffs Wild Horse Range

Just 8 miles from Grand Junction, you can clip-clop through the rocky, rugged terrain of this Bureau of Land Management's 36,000-acre area, and spot majestic wild mustangs — descendants of those brought here by Spanish settlers and one of only a few wild horse sanctuaries left in the country.

McInnis Canyons National **Conservation Area**

You'll feel just like a cowboy or cowgirl on Devil's Canyon trail, which moseys through red-rock canyons, hoodoos and pink-striped entrada sandstone cliffs.

Horseback Tours

Rimrock Adventures offers guided rides through Colorado's canyonlands, while Palisade Ranch provides trail rides and customized tours on more than 500 acres.

IF YOU'RE SEEKING ... SCENIC CRUISES FOR ROAD BIKING

Rim Rock Drive in Colorado National Monument

You'll see every spire, turret and sweeping red-rock canyon of Colorado National Monument on this iconic ride, spanning 23 miles from end to end. Learn more about the Monument on page 10.

Colorado Riverfront Trail System

A breezy way to explore the area, Grand Junction is the hub of this 24.5-mile paved

river trail system where you'll pass by parks, lakes, wildlife areas, botanical gardens and even a handy bike-repair station.

Fruit & Wine Byway

Pedal your way or get some assistance with an eBike from Rapid Creek Cycles through Palisade's famous vineyards, fruit orchards and lavender fields on one of the prettiest road-biking corridors in the country, with three routes ranging from 5 to 25 miles.

Grand Junction OHV Area

Kick up some dust at this sprawling desert wilderness just north of town, featuring single- and double-track trails, thrilling hill climbs and ridge rides that will take your breath away.

Bangs Canyon Management Area





Located just 6 miles from Downtown Grand Junction, the rugged, red-rock landscapes of Colorado National Monument have captivated artists, photographers and sightseers for centuries — and for good reason. Around every hairpin turn and stone tunnel of this 20,500-acre park, you'll discover wild, Western views that are sure to inspire you, too.

RIM ROCK DRIVE

Snaking around canyon rims and sheer cliffs, this 23-mile byway is the very definition of a scenic drive. It's also the quintessential way to explore Colorado National Monument from end to end, whether by car, bike or motorcycle. Consider it hiking in your car!

An engineering feat, Rim Rock Drive was hand-carved by the Civilian Conservation Corps in the 1930s, revealing rock layers that date back an astonishing two billion years. You can easily spend days exploring the numerous trails and vistas, from Red Canyon Overlook to Artists Point — a spot favored by plein air painters throughout the years. Keep your eyes peeled for bighorn sheep and golden eagles, two of the species lucky enough to call this place home.

2 COKE **OVENS TRAIL**

Less than a mile from Artists Point, pull off at the Coke Ovens Overlook to access one of the grandest views in Colorado National Monument (or anywhere, for that matter). A short, scenic walk leads to a viewpoint of the eponymous Coke Ovens — bulbous, buff-colored pinnacles that cut a striking figure against the terracottacolored canyon. From here, you can take a longer hike on Monument Canyon Trail to get a closer look at the massive redearth formations.

(6) RANGER-**GUIDED TOURS**

Get a deeper view of the park, its history and geologic features on a ranger-led tour, departing from the Saddlehorn Visitor Center daily, Memorial Day through Labor Day. Programs range from interpretive hikes to Junior Ranger programs. Be sure to check the park's online calendar before your visit or stop by the Visitor Center to see what's on the schedule.

(4) ROCK CLIMBING AT INDEPENDENCE **MONUMENT**

John Otto, who became the park's first ranger after its National Monument designation in 1911, was one of the earliest people to climb Independence Monument — a sandstone spire that soars 450 feet out of the canyon floor. Today, you can join the scores of climbers who flock here to see the incredible views from "Otto's Route" and other climbing routes, which range in difficulty from intermediate to advanced.

For the best experience, take a guided climb with Grand Junction Adventures, which is a park-approved outfitter. They know every pitch and pit on Independence Monument and can provide the proper gear and guidance to get you to the top safely and with a smile on your face.

easily flaked sandstone and vertical sections of Independence Monument present dangers for even experienced climbers. Always use extreme caution and check out the park's climbing rules and regulations at NPS.gov/ COLM before your visit.


5 SADDLEHORN **CAMPGROUND**

Perched high above Monument Canyon with sweeping vistas of Grand Junction, Saddlehorn Campground offers views you can normally only dream about. But here, they're the last thing you see before hitting the sack. A-Loop campsites are open yearround, and are available on a first-come, first-served basis, while the B-Loop is open mid-March through October and can be reserved up to six months in advance. It's time you camp on top of stunning red-rock and stargaze, don't you think?

Colorado National Monument Visitor Center

Located 4 miles from the west entrance, Colorado National Monument Visitor Center is a must-stop before exploring Colorado National Monument. Here you'll find maps, brochures, souvenirs, educational exhibits, and a knowledgeable staff that can point you to all the best trails and viewpoints.

Hours: Open daily, 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., with extended summer hours (8 a.m. to 6 p.m.). Closed Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's Day.





Float, Raft & Splash: GRAND JUNCTION'S WATERS

Grand Junction's hundreds of lakes and miles of rivers are perfect for a bounty of aquatic pursuits. In fact, the area is a watersports haven for whitewater rafting, stand-up paddleboarding, floating, fishing and much more.

COLORADO RIVER JET BOATING

For the thrill of your life, book a New Zealand-style jet boat tour on the Colorado River with Jet Boat Colorado. You'll fishtail, speed run and power slide your way to a pure adrenaline rush while a knowledgeable guide takes your family on a tour of the waterway on their custom jet boat Wild Mustang. Experience the famous wet-and-wild "Cowboy Spin," but if you're not up for getting drenched, opt for a scenic tour and enjoy a milder (and drier) ride. Book early — summer tours get snatched up fast!

GRAND MESA NATIONAL FOREST

The Grand Mesa is the largest flattop mountain in the world, boasting more than 300 lakes and 3,600 miles of tributaries overflowing with fantastic trout fishing and water sports. Try Bull Creek Reservoirs (#1 and #2), which offer opportunities to catch rainbow, cutthroat and brown trout. If you enjoy motoring across smooth-as-glass water, check out Sunset, Griffith or Glacier lakes. But if you want to explore in a canoe or kayak, visit Forty Acre Lake, Kitson Reservoir or Rimrock Lake, where the paddling is pristine since motorized boats are prohibited.

JAMES M. ROBB COLORADO RIVER STATE PARK

This 35-mile park stretches like a strand of pearls, with each section specifically designed to cater to distinct interests. Stop first at Island Acres, best if you're traveling west on I-70. Take a swim in the lake amid the area's distinct landscape of ribbed plateaus. This area is also home to Colorado's Wine Country, and Palisade River Trips, offering relaxing ways to soak in views of the growing region. If you're looking for a river launch, the best location is Connected Lakes. It's an idvllic spot for boats and rafts and offers a pier for those looking to do a little warm-water fishing.





HIGHLINE LAKE STATE PARK & MACK MESA LAKE

Located a half hour away from Downtown Grand Junction, Highline Lake State Park's two lakes have plenty of room for you to enjoy the thrill of racing past fellow jet skiers or notch it down for a relaxing kayak excursion. Head to Mack Mesa Lake for paddleboarding and cold- and warmwater fishing. If you're looking for an SUP tour, check out Grand Junction Stand Up Paddle Boarding Co.'s lessons, rentals and SUP yoga.

RUBY-HORSETHIEF CANYON

If getting off the beaten path is more your drink of water, visit the 25-mile stretch of the Colorado River that runs from Loma, Colorado, to Westwater, Utah. The Ruby-Horsethief section of the river is calm with occasional mild rapids encased in magnificent redrock canyons. Bring your camera to photograph bighorn sheep, bald eagles and the canyons that envelop you as you float down the river. Want to leave the gear and planning to someone else? Book a memorable day trek with Rimrock Adventures.





Since it's rare for so many lakes and reservoirs to be found so close together at such a high elevation, the Grand Mesa is a true treasure. And the national forest's 10,000-foot altitude means cooler temps in the summer, making the 300 lakes a stellar retreat from the heat.

Creative Chops

The **Downtown Grand Junction Creative District** has a plethora of artistic treasures, including murals, art galleries, hundreds of outdoor sculptures, and public pianos. Start your exploration with a First Friday Art Walk jumping off from the area's flagship gallery, the Western Colorado Center for the **Arts** — friendly staffers will give you the lowdown on other participating shops and collectives, like the Working Artists Gallery & Studio.

Peak Performance

Grand Junction is also a great place to embrace the performing arts. The historic Avalon Theatre has welcomed pop artists through the decades, from Al Jolson to Bela Fleck, and is host to the Grand Junction Symphony Orchestra and High Desert Opera — both offer outstanding productions.


History Lesson

Today, a diverse collection (of more than 100 sculptures) is on permanent display throughout the city's vibrant downtown. Each year, visiting experts curate a temporary sculpture exhibit, and if you think you have the perfect place to relocate a piece to your home — many are for sale.

Flower Power

Occupying a tranquil 15acre tract on the banks of the Colorado River, the Western Colorado Botanical Gardens is home to 600 local and exotic plant species. Stroll through the rose, herb, native, Western heritage and children's secret gardens (all peppered with picturesque fish ponds and lush landscaping) before making a visit to the Butterfly House to see magical metamorphosis in action.


Purple Reign

Growing conditions in the area are just perfect for lavender. Swing by Belli Fiori Lavender Farm for a stroll through their peaceful fields (they have 1,000 plants in 11 varieties) and browse a variety of items infused with the fragrant herb, including sugars, candles and bath & body care products.

Fresh Finds

Some of the area's cutest residents are ready to guide you through a peach orchard at SunCrest Orchard Alpacas and Fiber Works. Learn about the friendly animals, be paired with your own alpaca and take a 45-minute trek through the pastoral landscape. SunCrest also offers Mill Tours, including an overview of how natural fibers are transformed into yarn, as well as a store where you may purchase gifts made from alpaca yarn.

Board Games

Any ol' landlubber can float around on a standup paddleboard. But you haven't truly mastered the game until you've tried your hand (and the rest of your body) at SUP yoga with Grand Junction Stand Up Paddle Boarding Co. You'll start with some basic yoga postures on land, then cast off in nearby Highline Lake for a short paddle followed by an unforgettable floating asana sequence on your paddleboard.

River Dance

Or pedal the Fruit & Wine Byway, a 25-mile system of paved backcountry roads connecting 25 different points of interest - including more than a dozen wineries, fruit stands, and farms. Don't miss High

Country Orchards, Colterris Winery, Carlson Vineyards, Alida's Fruits or Aloha Organic Fruit.

EVENING:

End your wining-and-dining day with a relaxing dinner at 626 on Rood, where locally grown produce is perfectly paired with responsibly raised seafood, poultry and game. Break for lunch in historic Downtown Grand Junction at one of the longestoperating businesses in the downtown area, Blue Moon Bar & Grille, where the globally inspired menu feels like a journey in and

Then head over to the Museum of the West, where the interdisciplinary Western Investigations Team works to solve enduring mysteries of local heritage — including the gruesome tale of Colorado's infamous prospector turned cannibal, Alferd Packer. 

With our diverse landscapes and ample wide-open space, epic adventure is a year-round pursuit in western Colorado. Here's your season-by-season guide to getting the most out of Grand Junction's great outdoors — no matter what time of year you plan to visit.



FALL A



There are countless places to catch a glimpse of the brilliant fall colors on the Grand Mesa, but it's hard to top the 11-mile Crag Crest Trail — literally. High atop the mesa at a dizzying 11,170 feet, Crag Crest gives you a bird's-eye view of mountainsides gilded with shimmering aspens. Find more hiking trails on page 8 and at VisitGrandJunction.com/HikingTrails.

Hunting

The Grand Junction area is a mecca for big game and big birds, starting at the Uncompangre Plateau all the way to the White River and Gunnison National Forests. Hunting season for elk, pronghorn, deer, moose, desert bighorn sheep and other game runs from September through mid-November, while winter brings scores of ducks and geese to the Colorado River.

Fishing

FUN FACT: Grand Junction is named for the convergence of the **Colorado** and **Gunnison rivers** — two fantastic spots for trout fishing in our crisp-yet-sunny fall weather. The high-elevation lakes and streams of the Grand Mesa are also great destinations. Learn more about hunting and fishing at VisitGrandJunction.com/HuntingFishing.

Before setting out on your hunting or fishing excursion, you'll need to obtain the proper license from Colorado Parks and Wildlife — either online at Cpw.state.co.us, or at CPW's local offices and license vendors around the state.

WINTER ✷



Skiing & Snowboarding

As Snow's Perfect State™, we don't need to remind you that Colorado is a winter-sports wonderland, but we never tire of talking up Powderhorn Mountain Resort. The Grand Mesa resort averages 250 inches of light, dry powder each year and boasts some of the best glade skiing in the state. Powderhorn is affordable and only 45 minutes from Grand Junction.

Snowmobiling

Have a need for speed? Get your motor running on the Sunlight to Powderhorn Trail. This 120-mile route runs from Sunlight Mountain outside of Glenwood Springs to Powderhorn Mountain on the Grand Mesa, with spectacular mountain

backdrops and access to an additional 180 miles of trails along the way. Don't have a snow machine? Fret not, there are many rental shops to choose from.

Cross Country Skiing & Snowshoeing

The heavy snowfall and flat-top mountain terrain of the Grand Mesa make it a shoe-in for cross-country skiing, skate skiing and snowshoeing, thanks in large part to the Grand Mesa Nordic Council, which maintains 31 miles of glorious, groomed trails. Like to go off-piste? Pristine, ungroomed backcountry skiing is also available on the mesa. 


Road & Mountain Biking

Come springtime, the region plays host to a number of biking events, like the **Grand Enduro** and the Grand Junction Off-Road Mountain Bike **Endurance Event.**

Birding

Better bring your binoculars: The Riverfront Trail System is home to the 1.5-mile Audubon Section, just across the Colorado River from Downtown Grand Junction. 



Camping


In the height of summer, temperatures stay cool on top of the Grand Mesa. Pitch your tent high above the heat at Island Lake or Ward Lake campgrounds, both at 10,000 feet and where you can enjoy wildflower hikes and top-notch lake fishing. Alternatively, the grassy, shaded Book Cliffs Campground at Highline Lake State Park in Loma is the perfect home base for all types of water recreation, including swimming, boating and bass fishing. Whitewater Rafting

The Colorado River runs just south of Downtown Grand Junction, but it's the Westwater Canyon stretch — about 30 miles down the river — where the region's most popular whitewater rafting trips commence. OFF-ROAD FUN 😂

Year-Round Dirt

With hundreds of roads and trails to power your engines on, there are unlimited options to enjoy your offhighway vehicle (OHV) on, including your side-by-side, ATV, dirt bike and four-wheel drive. Many of the trails are open year-round.

Popular Trails

Access points around Grand Junction offer over 480,000 acres of public lands that are open to OHV travel. Trails in OHV areas zig-zag back and forth across the striking landscape. Bangs Canyon and Rabbit Valley Recreation Area are two popular OHV areas in Grand Junction. The Grand Mesa and North Fruita Desert also fun areas offering a labyrinth of trails.

Single Track

For avid dirt bike riders looking for single track, you will be surprised by the network of trails available in the Grand Junction area - check out Third Flats. We've all heard of Moab, but there is vastly more single track here. Bring your own machinery or rent from several businesses who carry a wide range of inventory.

PALISADE PLUNGE 🙈

One-Of-A-Kind Descent

Plunge from the top of the Grand Mesa National Forest for 32 miles of downhill single-track adrenaline-pumping action. The Plunge trail connects the top of the Grand Mesa to the valley with 6000 feet in elevation descent through pristine public lands.

Rooted in History

The route connects a variety of trails on top of the Grand Mesa which are steeped in history. John Otto forged new paths more than a century ago. Otto was a local explorer who was Colorado National Monument's first custodian, and was the main advocate for getting the Monument recognized as part of the National Park System.

Scenery

The single-track trail winds through aspen groves, alpine forests and high desert, some of which has long been unused for hundreds of years, except by 4th generation ranchers and their cattle.

Expert

Yes, you read that right! This singletrack is not for the faint of heart. There is no exit route, so once you commit, you're all in.

POWDERHORN 🄏

Cool Vibe

Colorado is known for its huge resorts and high-end mountain villages, but the smaller ski resorts continue to grow and gain considerable interest. Affordable, family-friendly, no I-70 traffic jam (just 45 minutes from Grand Junction) and a comfortable vibe is why Powderhorn continues to attract newcomers.

Powder

On average 250 inches of white fluffy snow blankets this ski resort which offers 1,600 feet of elevation gain and access to over 60 runs with 20 percent green, 50 percent blue and 30 percent black. Bear Claw, Mudslide, and Cannonball are a few favorites. From the top of the mountain, you can access an abundance of backcountry runs.

Tree Skiing

Another quality that sets Powderhorn apart is the tree skiing. Much of the resort is covered with pine trees and dense aspen groves, making for unique powder-filled runs. Some of the best tree skiing on the mountain is accessed from the West End lift.

A DIFFERENT SIDE OF COLORADO

After living on the Front Range of Colorado for 25 years, I thought I knew Colorado inside and out. From adventuring in Rocky Mountain National Park to rafting the Arkansas River, climbing 14'ers to crawling up the Incline, hanging out at countless festivals to fine dining and craft beverage tasting – this and so much more is the Colorado we all know.



With so much public land and plenty of wide-open spaces, it's easy to adventure outdoors and not see a soul. It gets more and more difficult to recreate in other parts of Colorado and escape the crowds, but not in Grand Junction! It feels so roomy out here on this side of the Divide. I heard this when I arrived here and I am pretty convinced - Mother Nature really does play favorites.

No traffic and plenty of parking. You don't believe me, do you? It's true! It's so easy to get around Grand Junction, and parking

downtown is a breeze. The parking meters are only 50 cents per hour and free after 4 pm, including free weekends and holidays! Am I in Mayberry?



Theo Otte is the executive chef behind Grand Junction's critically acclaimed grand eatery 626 on Rood — named a Good Food 100 Restaurant for its commitment to sustainability and supporting local food systems. Here, Chef Theo shares insight into the ethos behind his restaurant, his passion for cooking and what he loves most about Grand Junction.

Why did you decide to live and open your restaurant in Grand Junction?

My wife and business partner, Brenda, is originally from Grand Junction. When she decided she wanted to move back. I followed her and immediately fell in love with the area. Standing in the valley surrounded by the Grand Mesa, the Book Cliffs and Colorado National Monument, we knew this was where we wanted to be.

Why is sourcing food locally important to you?

For us, sourcing everything we can locally is about being the best we can be for our community. We want to know where our ingredients come from, and that the people growing our food care as much about it as we do. We love getting to know the area's farmers and ranchers. By supporting the hard work and dedication they put into their farms, including produce and livestock, it provides greater meaning toward the service we provide here. To us, that's really special.

What's your favorite season for fresh produce in the Grand Junction area?

I love the last two weeks of August. With a little help from Mother Nature, everything is at its peak during those last two weeks. Also, I love Palisade peaches, and that's the time of the season when they are the juiciest. They have the perfect amount of time to develop sugar, providing for the sweetest peaches around, and that's what they are known for.

626 on Rood has a notable wine collection. Where does that love of wine come from?

It all comes back to food. Sure, we have a few wines just for sitting on the porch and sipping, but whenever I taste wine, I'm always thinking about the food. What's on the menu that this wine would pair well with? Will this help bring out the flavor or is it overwhelming? Food and wine were made to go together. The perfect glass paired with the right entree will elevate both to new levels of character.

What about your passion for cooking, where does that come from?

I grew up on the east coast in a large Italian family. Big family meals were a part of growing up, and we were always using old family recipes. Cooking and food were important to us. I grew up learning to appreciate and eventually love the art of it.



> Junction. She is a mysterious lover. one that natives and visitors alike will attest to.




The 23-mile paved road through Colorado National Monument boasts spectacular viewpoints of the landmark's otherworldly canyonlands.

LEAVE NO TRACE – CARE FOR COLORADO **PRINCIPLES**

KNOW BEFORE YOU GO

- Our state and federal agencies manage 42 percent of Colorado's majestic landscape, and our cities and counties maintain even more. Learn about and respect the spaces we all share.
- Stay back from the pack. Find your way to less-visited and off-peak destinations to minimize down time and maximize your connection with special places.
- Bring along reusable water bottles or hot drink tumblers to limit waste and stay hydrated in our dry climate.

STICK TO TRAILS

With 39,000 marked trails and 13,000 designated campsites, there's no need to venture beyond. By sticking to these areas and camping at least 200 feet from lakes, rivers and streams, you're helping natural areas stay natural.



Even though shortcuts can be tempting, please don't take them. A few extra strides on the path will protect plants and the homes of the true locals.

LEAVE IT AS YOU FIND IT

- Leave plants, rocks and historical items as you find them so others experience the joy of discovery.
- Any of our 750 different species of wildflowers will live forever in a photo. Snap away, but only with a camera.
- Colorado is beautiful all on its own. Building structures or campsites on public land isn't cool. Keep it pristine for everyone to enjoy.

■ Treat all living things with respect. Carving or hacking plants and trees may kill or disfigure them.

TRASH THE TRASH



- Pack it in, pack it out. Or pick it up to leave a place better than you found it. Put litter, even crumbs, peels and cores in your nearest waste/recycling bin.
- Wash yourself, your dog or whatever else needs cleaning at least 200 feet from waterways, and use biodegradable soap. A bubble bath is no treat for fish.
- If you have to poo, walk at least 70 steps from trails, water and people. Dig a cat hole 6 inches deep, do your thing in the hole, cover it and pack out your TP. Or, use a wag bag (a disposable bag found in most outdoor stores) so you can pack out your waste.

- Colorado's low humidity has perks, but can create dry, dangerous conditions. Keep campfires small and manageable to avoid sparking wildfires.
- When putting out a fire, water it until you can handle the embers. Never let a fire burn unattended.
- Use care when smoking in Colorado's dry climate. Always put cigarettes out completely, and don't leave your butts behind.
- Always check for local fire restrictions.



- Colorado is home to tens of thousands of furry, scaly and feathered creatures. To keep them - and you - safe, don't approach them.
- It is not adorable to feed wild animals. You could alter natural behaviors, exposing them to predators or even euthanasia.
- Keep your furry buddies leashed when enjoying dog-friendly trails, and pack out their waste. All the way to a trashcan.

SHARE OUR TRAILS & PARKS



- Chances are you're not out in nature to people watch, so try out the lesser-known paths and sites.
- Silence your cell phone before stepping into nature, and speak softly without using the speaker function.
- Be considerate when passing others on the trails and yield to the uphill hiker and biker - they need the momentum.
- Listen to nature. Keep your voice and music soft so all can enjoy the peace of Colorado.
